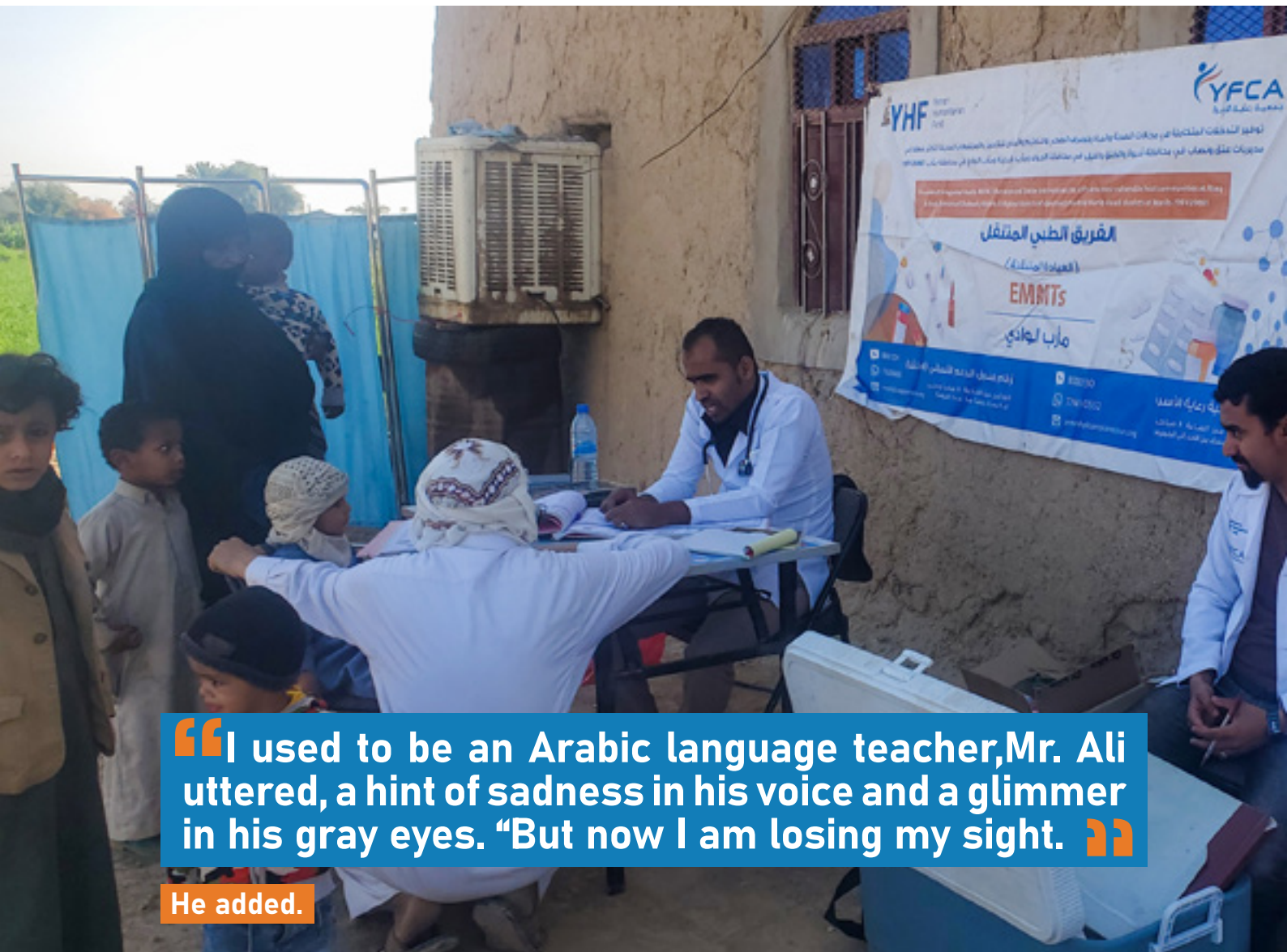

COME ALONG TO RESCUE THOSE IN NEED



Mr. Ali's eyes glistened with sadness as he recounted the difficult life he and his family live since they had to abandon their homes and move to Arsh Balqis camp. They had nothing but what they were wearing. He used to be an Arabic language teacher, he revealed in a sorrowful

voice, but the war has taken away everything from them. Even worse, he was suffering from chronic stress disease and constant headaches which had resulted in him having poor eyesight. With no access to medical care, Mr. Ali had no way to treat his affliction.



“I used to be an Arabic language teacher, Mr. Ali uttered, a hint of sadness in his voice and a glimmer in his gray eyes. “But now I am losing my sight.”

He added.

Then, fortunately, the mobile team in the health vehicles, funded by YHF through YFCA, arrived. They provided healthcare to all beneficiaries (BNF's) in camps, and treated fevers, diarrhea, pneumonia, and other common illnesses. The team also provided specialized care to pregnant and lactating women, and people with chronic

diseases like diabetes and high blood pressure, giving the diagnosis, treatment, and necessary medicines. During this intervention, Mr. Ali's chronic pressure disease was diagnosed, and the appropriate treatment was given to him, with the team regularly monitoring the condition. His health has greatly improved.



When asked about the mobile team, Mr. Ali said that all family members of patients were treated, examined, and medicines were dispensed for free. He and his family no longer had to visit any other centers. At the internally displaced people (IDPs) camps, the news that the mobile team had arrived was like a ray of hope for the families of patients, bringing with it the promise of free

medical care, diagnosis, and treatment. 50 cases per day, about 1100 cases in a month were treated by the medical team. Now, the IDPs and the locals no longer had to worry about exorbitant medical bills, or traveling to far-off medical centers. Instead, they could turn to the mobile team for all their medical needs, with the assurance that their family members would be taken care of.
